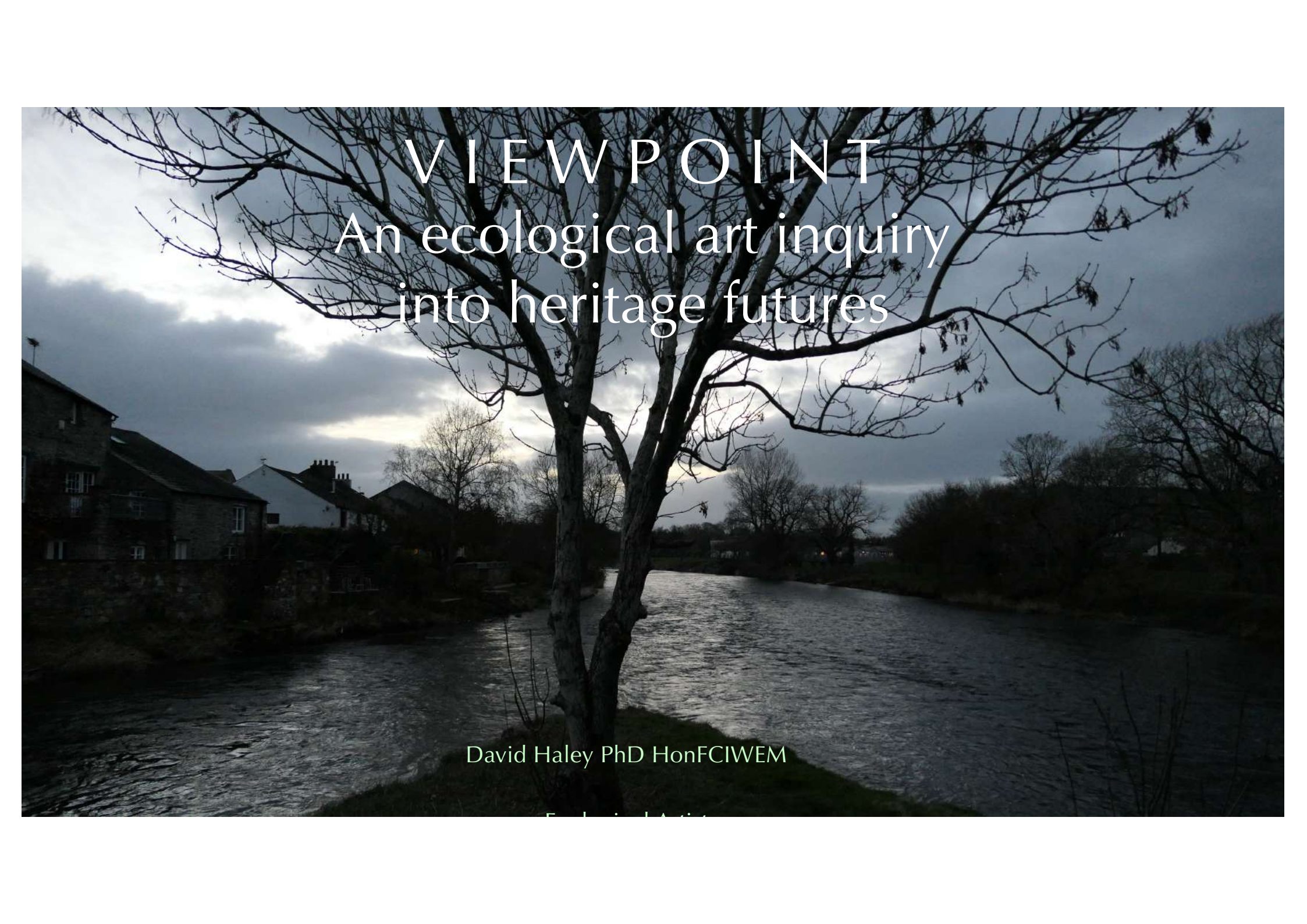

AFTERMATH THE OLD KINGS ARMS LANE AFTER THE 2009 FLOODS

The Old Kings Arms Lane at the height of the flooding had excess of 1.7 metres (5'6") of water, the shops on the ground floor had 1.00 metres (3'3") of water and the cafe at the end of the lane 1.50 metres (5'0"). None of the units on the first floor, apart from access, suffered damage.

Out of this disaster it gave us the opportunity to remove the old fence and build the wall to create the Cockermouth History Wall.

We and the people of Cockermouth can share our wall and Cockermouth has been reinstated as a beautiful Georgian town.

The Great Flood of 2009

In 2009 Cockermouth suffered flood waters described as being of biblical proportions. On the 19th November 2009 the rivers Cocker and Derwent started to overflow their banks. By the evening the flood waters in the town reached their peak at 2.44 metres and travelling at a speed of 35 knots resulting in businesses from Allendale Court Hotel in Market Place down Main Street to St Josephs Catholic Church in Crown Street being wiped out. Up to 900 people in the town lost businesses and homes.

The emergency services, which included helicopters from RAF Valley, Boulmer and Leconfield, boats of the RNLI, Mountain Rescue Teams, Police and Fire Service worked heroically through the 19th and 20th November in horrendous conditions.

The people of Cockermouth and the surrounding area will be forever grateful. Businesses and households have taken up to two years to recover.

M-SPORT World Rally Champions

M-Sport has operated Ford's World Rally programme since 1997, growing in size and stature since it was originally formed in 1979 under the name of Malcolm Wilson Motorsport and based in premises alongside Wilson's house near Cockermouth in North-West England.

Following the career of Wilson as a driver, the company grew during the 1980s when the pace of expansion grew rapidly to mirror the success it was having throughout the world with the Ford Escort Cosworth. In 1994 it won national titles in Italy, Portugal, the Middle East and Britain, the latter with Wilson himself behind the wheel.

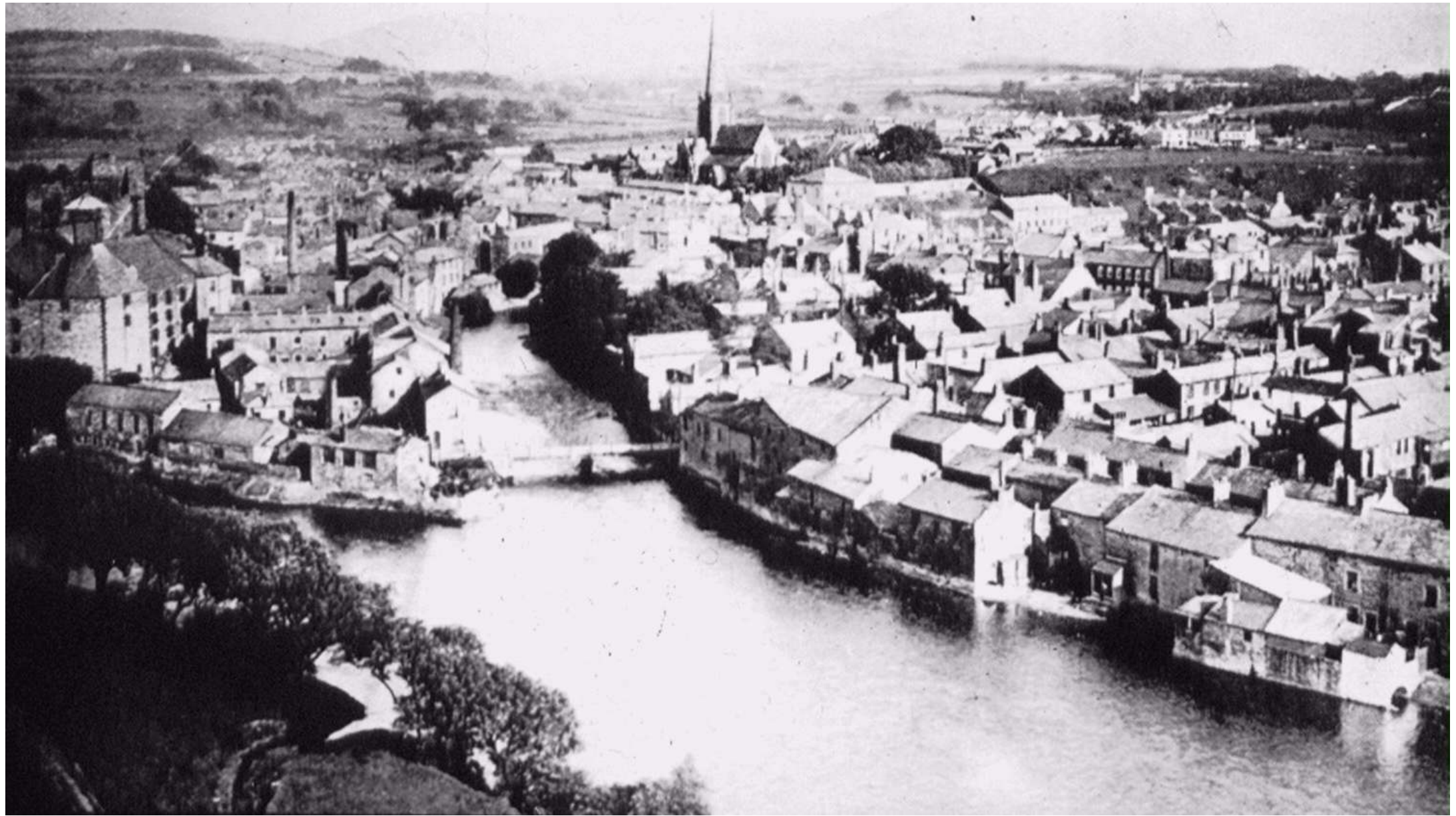
Two years later the company claimed a superb third place on Rally Finland with Jarmo Kytölehto at the wheel of an Escort Cosworth and the world stage beckoned.

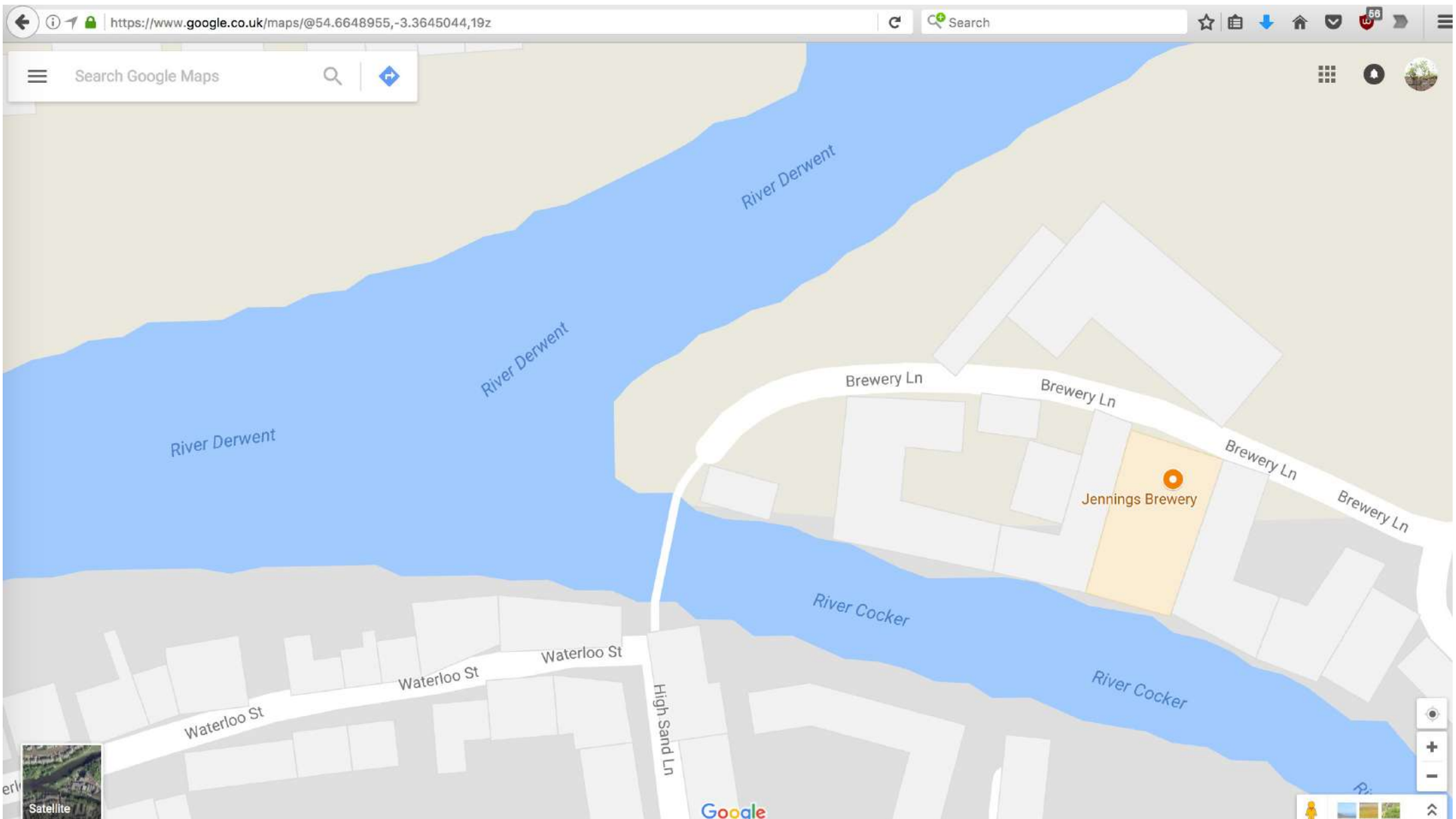
At the end of that season, Ford selected the team to take over the running of its WRC programme. Despite desperately little time to grow from a small company to one capable of running a two-car WRC programme, Malcolm Wilson Motorsport became M-Sport and the team won two rounds of the series and Ford finished runner-up in the Manufacturers' Championship. It built the all-new Ford Focus World Rally Car in 1996 to rally in 1999 and the model continues to win WRC events.

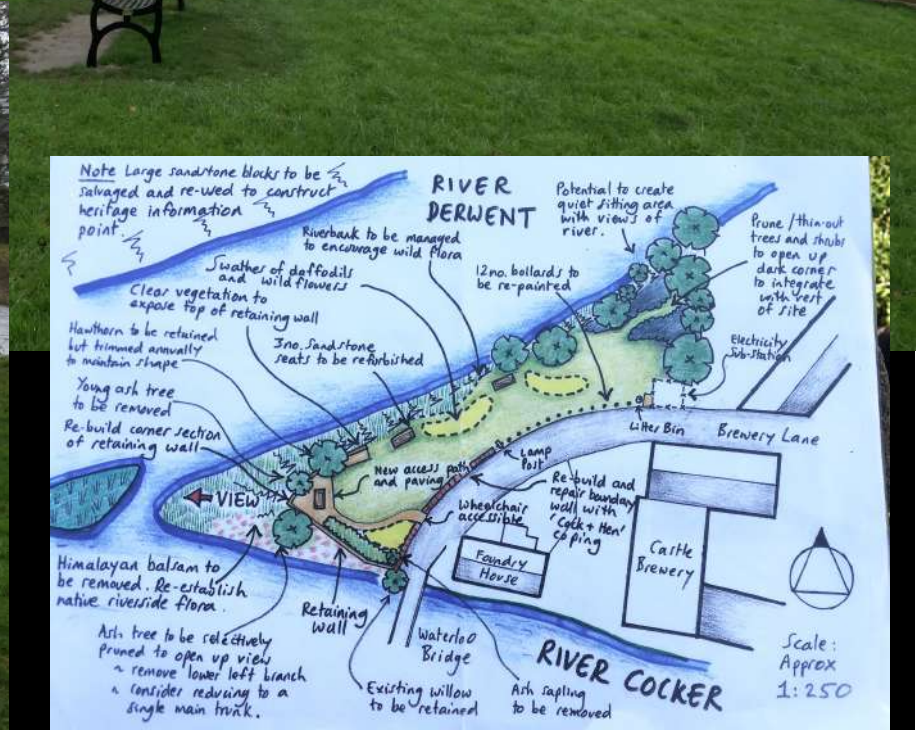
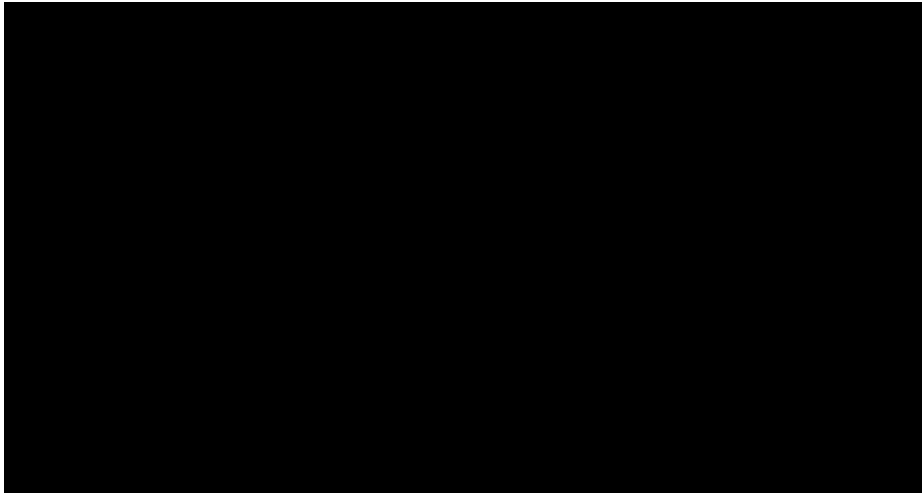
Ford has finished runner-up in the Manufacturers' series on seven occasions under M-Sport, but the highlight came in 2006 when the Blue Oval won the FIA World Rally Championship for the first time in 27 years. It was followed in 2007 by a second WRC title.

M-Sport also operates a thriving customer business for private teams. It assists Ford drivers with programmes in more than 12 countries involving Focus RS WRC, Fiesta S2000, Fiesta R2 and GpN Fiesta ST rally cars. The Fiesta R2 and ST models are eligible to compete in M-Sport's one-make formula - the Fiesta Sport Trophy - which was launched in 2006 and runs in eleven different countries, as well as the Fiesta Sporting Trophy International, which follows the World Rally Championship calendar.

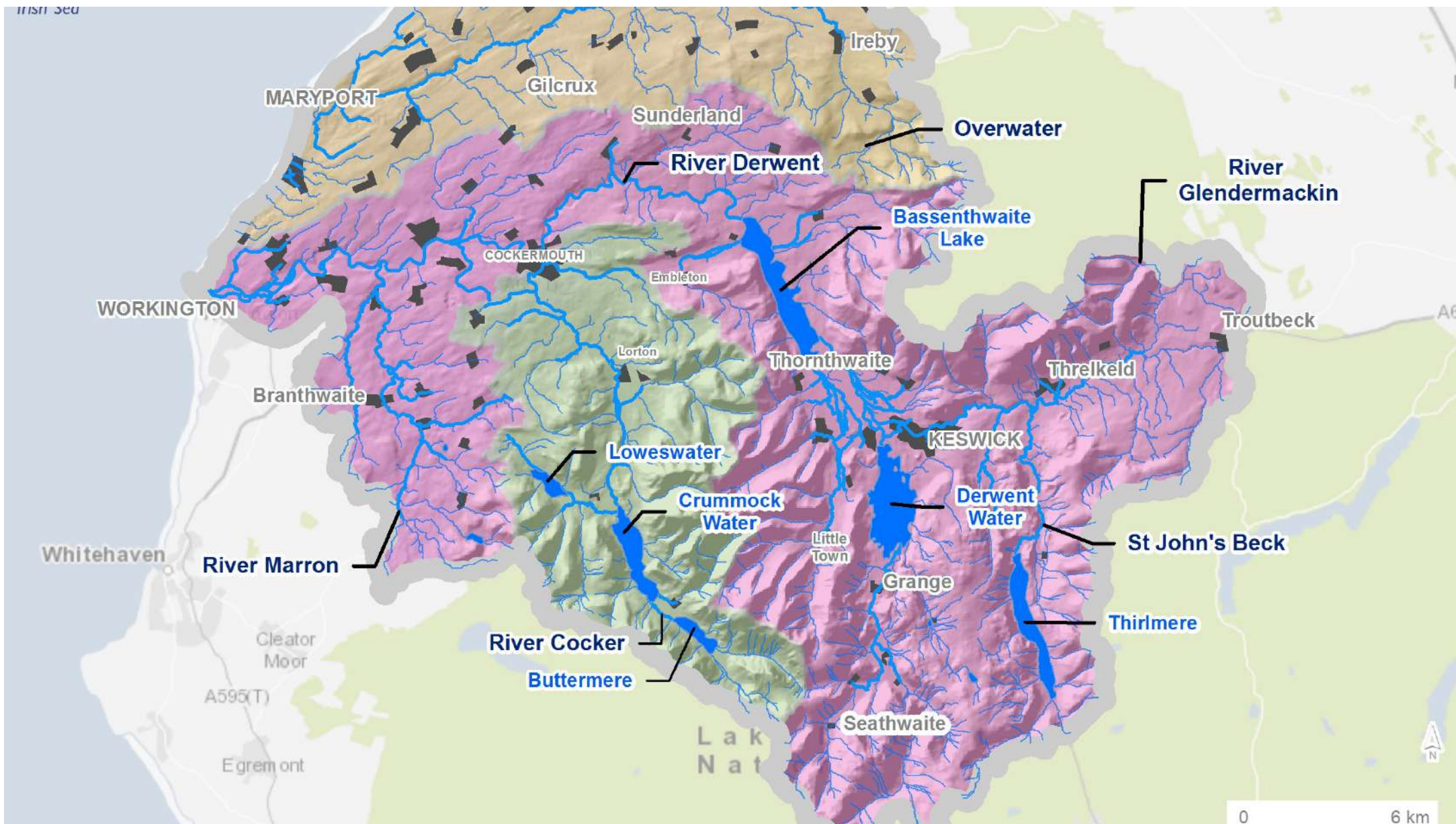


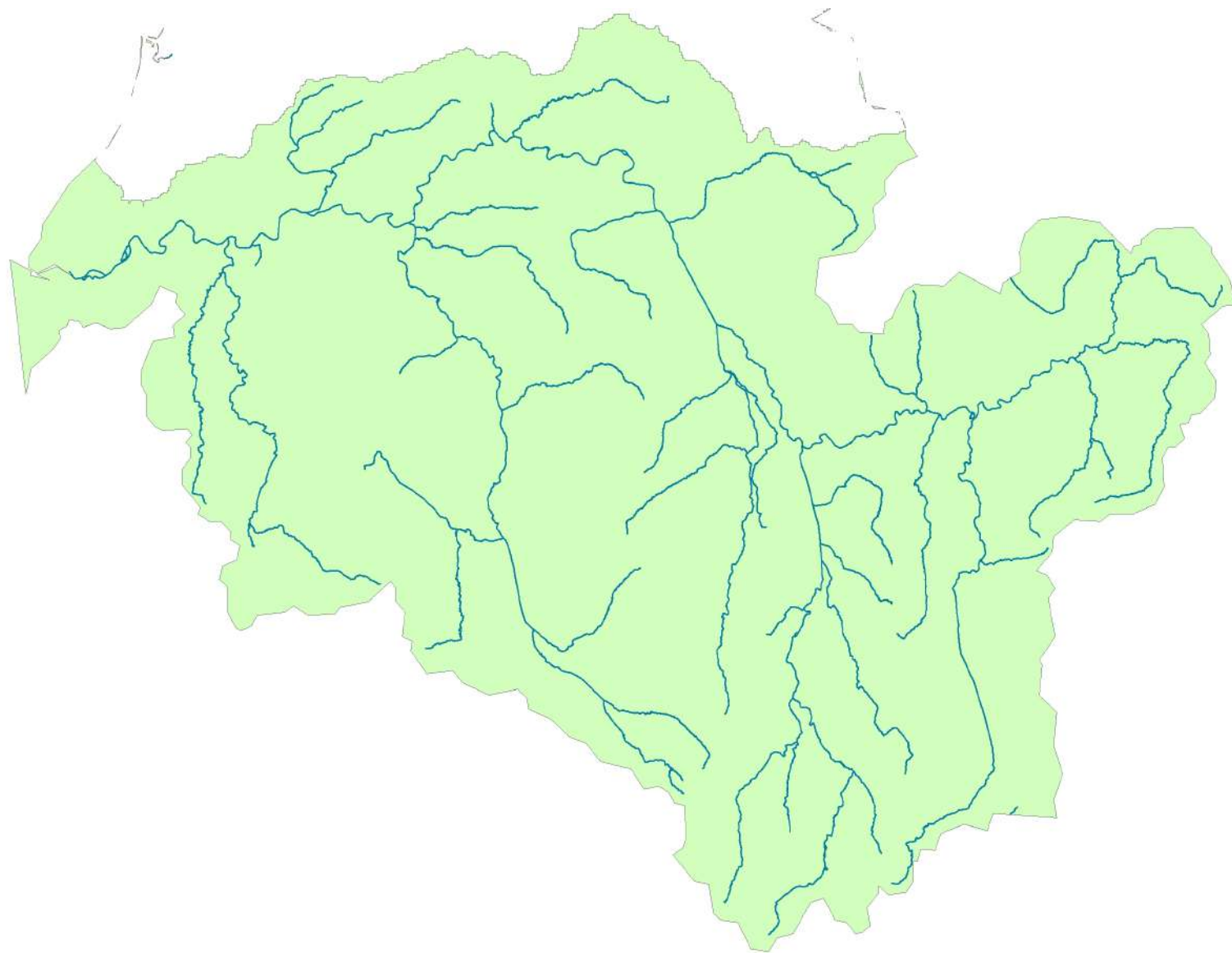
